Integrating Technology in Education (John MacLeod; 8:30AM-11:00AM)

The key to integrating technology for the benefit of students is to find the resources that support learning or engagement. In this session, participants will discuss how to select appropriate resources for learning as well as how to introduce them to students. Additionally, the presenter will introduce best practices for using technology to engage families in their students' educational experience. The session will include an introduction to several free resources for instruction as well as family engagement, including *Purdue Online Writing Lab, Wonderopolis, Buncee*, and *Google Classroom*.
