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Top JMC students honored at spring banquet

Five students who were selected as the best in their respective JMC programs were honored at the annual JMC awards banquet and at the University's Honors Day.

They were Ashley Johns, advertising; David Dycus, electronic media; Jessica Jeffress, journalism; Shannon Davis, public relations; and Rui Qu, graduate program.

Johns served two years as president of Ads Club and three years as presenter in the annual National Student Advertising Competition. She was named to this year's "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities."

She was a Student Ambassador, a member of the women's crew team, a member of the Hart Residential College Honor Society and the coordinating officer for the G-Factor Campaign to retrain students for MSU.

She received a 2008 American Association of Advertising Agencies internship where she worked in media planning with Walt Disney Studios Home Entertainment in North Hollywood, Calif.

Johns also worked as a sales representative for *The Chicago Tribune* and a media consultant for ConferencePlus, Inc. in Schaumburg, Ill. She was named a Most Promising Minority Student for 2009 by the American Advertising Federation.

Dycus used his video skills in his minor of theatre, with productions on MSU TV-11 and with *The Murray State News'* web site. He was responsible for filming and editing video content for the site.

He worked with the MSU Student Recreation and Wellness Center and with Biokinetics Family Fitness in Calvert City.

Jeffress, who had a minor in business administration, was the designer and editor in chief of the *Shield* yearbook. The 2008 edition was named a Pacemaker Finalist (top 15 yearbooks in the country) by the Associated Collegiate Press.

She also worked as a writer/photographer in the university public relations office and had an internship with *FLW Outdoors* Magazine.

Her other work experience included editorial assistant with the New Caledonian Press, a writer/editor for *Murray Life* Magazine and a designer for K-Squared Designs.

Davis, a transfer from the University of Kentucky, had a double major in public relations and Spanish.

She was an officer in Public Relations Student Society of America and editor of the MSU chapter newsletter. She was also the chapter publicity director for the "Bands n' BBQ Blowout."

Valentine recognized for teaching excellence

Robert Valentine, senior lecturer in the Department of Journalism and Mass Communications, has been named the recipient of the 2009 Regents Teaching Award for the College of Business and Public Affairs.

Valentine, a member of the faculty since 1974, teaches in advertising and is the instructor for the beginning course (JMC 168) for all majors in the department. He has taught in theatre and served as guest director for the MSU Theatre.

He began his teaching career at the University of Kentucky, where he earned his undergraduate degree in history and his master's in communications. He then served as lecturer in communications before coming to MSU to teach speech courses and serve as the director of forensics.

His debate team won the national title in 1982 and captured many event trophies during his years as the debate coach.

He left teaching for several years to start several companies, including Theatre Arts Enterprises, Medical Claims Services and Prologue, LLC.

The owner/publisher of *Murray Life* Magazine, he serves as senior editor for the Wake Up Book Series. He also has served as acting director of the Community Theatre in Murray.

He is known for his portrayal of the Unknown Scout, Thomas Edison, Mark Twain and most recently, Nathan B. Stubblefield. He also performs at Scottish games throughout the U.S. and has a CD of Scottish stories, "I'll Take the Low Road."

Valentine returned to full-time teaching in 1999 with a split load between JMC and Theatre. In 2001 he became co-head of Elizabeth Residential College with Bob McGaughey and served as the head from 2003-2007. As college head, he set up and taught many sessions in the residence hall and he and McGaughey taught the first forcredit course in the residential college.

He has taught for many years in the annual JMC High School Journalism and Broadcasting Workshop.

News professionals discuss future of print and broadcast journalism

Two news executives, Kevin Finch and Duke Conover, spoke at a media forum April 15 on "The Future of Daily Newspapers and Local TV Stations" at the Curris Center.

Finch, TV news director with WISH-TV (CBS) in Indianapolis, and Conover, managing editor of *The Paducah Sun*, shared their views and forecasts of the status of the media with JMC students and faculty/staff.

Finch noted that major market TV stations were still doing well and delivering about the same audience as before the recession. Conover said that while big city dailies were experiencing severe economic problems, small dailies and weeklies continue to be profitable.

Finch, a 1981 JMC graduate, has 24 years of experience in radio and TV news.

A national Edward R. Murrow Award-winning broadcast journalist, he has been the news director at WISH since early 2007.

Before that, he served as the

assistant news director. He also worked 13 years at the NBC affiliate, WTHR-TV.

Throughout his news career, he has covered major political and sporting events.

He has covered four national political conventions, a presidential inauguration, the Senate impeachment trial of President Clinton and the 9-11 events in Washington.

He headed up large crews at the Olympic Games in Atlanta, Sydney, Australia and Salt Lake City. He also executively produced coverage of 11 Indy 500's, the NBA finals, the AFC championships and the NCAA men's Final Four.

In addition to the Murrow Award, he has received two national Community Service Emmy Finalists, two regional Emmy Awards, a George Foster Peabody Award and several first-place awards from the Indiana Associated Press Broadcasters and the Society of Professional Journalists.

Prior to coming to the Paducah newspaper, he spent seven years as the editor of *The News Herald* in Morganton, N.C.

In addition to participating in the forum, the two news executives spoke to classes and attended the JMC Awards Banquet.

Lochte presents research at national conferences

The first presentation, "Is there a Pink Slip in Your Future? "While doing research for my radio show about the Fifties, I read many men's magazines of the era and became fascinated with ads for ICS—how sophisticated the campaign was," Lochte said.

The second presentation was at the American Culture Association Annual Convention in New Orleans April 8-11. The topic was "Big Time Wrestling on TV: A Symbiotic Relationship." "Since childhood, I've been a fan of professional wrestling," Lochte admits. "The promotions could not exist without TV stations throughout the Fifties and Sixties, and today national wrestling telecasts are among the most popular programs on at least three networks."

Lochte, a member of the JMC faculty since 1988, is the host and producer of "the Eisenhower Hour" on WKMS-FM.

Marion paper helps community in ice storm's aftermath

Chris Evans, a JMC grad, knows the news business never stops.

Evans, editor/publisher of *The Crittenden Press*, drove his family to Paris, Tenn., his hometown, immediately after the ice storm and continued to Jackson, Tenn., to buy generators and find a cellphone signal.

The Press had already printed its Jan. 28 edition. The paper had little information about the winter storm, so Evans and his staff put together a two-page copier-size edition filled with basic information about water, power, phone service and emergency services.

With no power throughout Crittenden County, the pages served as the sole source of public information. *The Press* distributed the special edition free throughout the town and to the shelters.

Radio station WMLJ was knocked off the air for the first week of the storm. Some residents could listen to WPSD's radio feed if they had battery-operated radios.

"I feel like we met our obligation to the communi-

ty," Evans said. "We felt like we needed to keep people informed."

Evans relied on a freelancer to post updates to the newspaper's Web site and his editor's blog. Without Internet service, he couldn't access the newspaper's e-mail account where emergency agencies sent information.

Evans called former Crittenden resident Matthew Patton, who lives in Pennsylvania, with information to post to the blog and access to e-mail.

Patton also called friends and family in the area, Evans said. He said readers from outside Kentucky relied on the site for news about their hometown.

During the days after the storm, *The Press* ran off a generator and produced the paper a day early. Evans said he wanted residents to have up-to-date information.

The Press also published its free shopper, The Early Bird, with storm stories. "We almost canceled it, but it's a free publication and total saturation, so I figured we might be able to get it to everybody."

After almost 10 days *The Press* finally regained power and the Internet service.



Stubblefield program receives two Kentucky history awards

The Kentucky Historical Society recognized Murray State University's Center for Telecommunications Systems Management (TSM) and Television Production with two Kentucky History Awards.

Both awards recognized the television program "Nathan Stubblefield Speaks," the centerpiece of a year-long commemoration by TSM of Nathan B. Stubblefield's wireless telephone patent issued in 1908.

Dr. Bob Lochte adapted the script from his book on Stubble-field and Dan Knowles of Paris, Tenn., provided the traditional and original banjo music for the soundtrack.

He has received a scholarship twice to attend the Mid-America Press Institute with emphasis in developing web sites.



Dr. Corley Dennison, head of the School of Journalism and Mass Communications at Marshall University, sought student input during his March visit. Dennison reviewed the department's accreditation efforts and offered insight on the review process.

From the chair:

As the school year comes to an end, 4 things are on my mind — accreditation, technology, curricu-

curriculum, and the cost of a Murray State education.

This fall, we renew the ACE-JMC accreditation of all undergraduate programs – Advertising, Journalism, Public Relations, and Television Production.

We are currently writing the self-study, a massive document that describes who we are, what we do, and how our graduates benefit from it.

The site visit team arrives for three days in late October to tour the facilities and talk to students, faculty, staff, and administrators.

There are nine standards by which we are judged, including curriculum, facilities, expertise, strategic planning, and outcomes assessment.

Dr. Corley Dennison, head of the School of Journalism and Mass Communications at Marshall University, visited us in March for a preliminary review and found us in compliance with six standards. On two others, we need to rewrite sections of the report to clarify what we are doing. On the last one, which deals with facilities, we need to invest in new equipment and update facilities.

That brings me to topic number 2 - technology. Through your generosity and the attention of Dean Tim Todd, who has made ACEJMC accreditation a priority for the College of Business, we are able to build a new multimedia computer lab in the Fine Arts building and upgrade the second computer lab there and the one in Wilson Hall. We are also acquiring \$50,000 in new digital audio, video, and graphics equipment to support classes for all our majors. It's going to be a busy summer.

My third interest is curriculum. We had a very successful review of the Television Production sequence this year. Students and faculty are excited about the new focus on independent television production. Now we must tackle the challenge of the Journalism curriculum. As you know from following what's happening in the newspaper, television news, and online news businesses, the market is changing very rapidly because the audience is finding new ways to get the information it needs for daily life. Our curriculum must evolve to accommodate the new realities.

Finally, I'm concerned with what it costs to attend Murray State University and the political and social reactions to higher tuition, fees, and cost of textbooks and supplies.

In the past 20 years, the share of Murray State's budget covered by state funding has declined from slightly more than half to about one third. Stu-

dents, their parents, and charitable alumni such as you have had to make up the difference. Tuition and fees are going up again next year. We are trying to help by eliminating textbooks in some classes, replacing them with instructional software or less costly online resources.
