Six recognized as top students

Six students were chosen as the top students in their respective programs for 2009-10 by the faculty and staff of the Department of Journalism and Mass Communications.

They are Miranda Arnold, Robin Phelps, Erin Richerson, David Columbia, David Green and Elizabeth Thomas.

Arnold was selected as the Outstanding Senior in Advertising. A marketing minor from Belleville, Ill., she worked in marketing and sales for Roadside Systems in St. Louis.

She was vice president and a presenter at the national student advertising competition for the Ads Club. She served as a student ambassador for the College of Business and was a member of Campus Outreach.

Phelps, from Cape Girardeau, Mo., was named the Outstanding Senior in Journalism. She also had a major in organizational communication.

Selected for this year's "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities," she served as editor, assistant editor, copy editor and staff writer for *The Murray State News*. She was a free-lance writer for *The Paducah Sun*.

She was debate captain of the Speech & Debate Union and vice president of the Kentucky Forensics Association.

She was a member of the Student Government's Campus Activities Board, president of Omicron Sigma Kappa, secretary of the Black Student Council and a student ambassador for the College of Business.

She won several awards in both the Kentucky Intercollegiate Press Association competition and in speech and debate tournaments.

Her senior year she won the North South Intercollegiate tournament and the MSU Invitational tournament. She finished with a career OVC Tournament average of 78.75.

After graduation, she worked at EF Education in Boston in graphic design and marketing. Her next job was in marketing and sales with Ladies Golf.Com. She then worked for more than three years as a design consultant for Ethan Allen.

After her first child (Hugo) was born in 2004, she and husband Steven moved to her native Sweden. In February 2009 she and her family moved to Tranas where Steven became the head pro at Tranas GK.

She is the business manager, doing the accounts, purchasing, merchandising, sales and staff management.

He is remembered for his performances against some of the top teams in the nation. He scored 33 points against Purdue, 32 points against Louisville and 26 points in the Racers' 1995 NCAA game against North Car-

Brown played with the Portland Trail Blazers, the Vancouver Grizzlies and the Detroit Pistons of the NBA before becoming one of the top players in the Euroleague.

He has played with eight teams and been a part of 17 championships, including the French National Championship, the French National Cup, the Turkish National Championship, the Turkish National Cup, the Spanish National Championship, the Israeli League Championship and the Baltic League Championship.

He has been a league Most Valuable Player 10 times and selected to the All-Euroleague first team once and second team

Brown is the all-time leading scorer in Euroleague history, scoring his 2,500 point March 11, 2009. He was listed as one of the Euroleague's 35 greatest alltime players.

In addition, she is a member of the board of directors for the Cooperative Center for Study Abroad (CCSA) and has served as assistant director or director of 13 overseas programs in England, Ireland, Australia and Scotland.

She taught International Mass Communications in the London Winter Program (December 2006-January 2007) and is scheduled to teach the class again this summer in London.

A graduate of Murray State with a bachelor's and a master's degree in journalism, Wall earned a master's degree in library science from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana. After

doing graduate work in educational leadership at Vanderbilt University, she completed her doctorate in communication at the University of Kentucky in 2000.

In 1980, Wall joined the Murray State faculty as a reference librarian and assistant professor. In 1987 she became the Study Abroad Coordinator for the MSU Center of International Programs. Later she was the assistant director and then the acting director of the center.

The recipient of the Student Support Services' Fabulous Faculty Award, she has been nominated three times by the JMC Department for the Regents Teaching Award. In 2006 she was named the Distinguished Professor by the MSU Alumni Association.

Dr. Kevin Qualls, an assistant professor in Murray State University's Department of Journalism and Mass Communications, has received notification from the Kentucky Bar Association that one of his legal presentations has been approved for Continuing Legal Education credit.

Approved was Qualls' presentation, "From Online to In-Court: Social Media and Tort Liability," that he gave to the McCracken County Bar Association in May.

Qualls said that the main point was for the lawyers to realize that their business clients are publishers if they maintain a presence on social media and that they are liable for what is published.

Faculty present at MAPOR

Three faculty members in Murray State University's Department of Journalism and Mass Communications presented papers at the Midwest Association for Public Opinion Research annual conference in Chicago Nov. 20-21.

Dr. Kevin Qualls' and Gill Welsch's presentation was "Your Comments Are Invited: A Content Analysis of Online Comments to Local News."

The study examined 30 randomly selected newspaper Web sites from across the nation to determine the types of stories that readers comment on and the types of comments that they leave.

The research paper classified online news stories into six categories: spot news, human interest news, government news, school news, general news and political news.

The general news stories captured the most reader comments, followed by political news, spot news, government news, school news and human interest news.

The types of comments were classified as being positive,

negative, neutral or other. The vast majority of comments—almost 60 percent—were negative.

White's paper, "So you really want to be in the movies? Demonstrating effects of institutional portrayals in Hollywood releases," was coauthored by Steve Everett and Rob Daves.

The paper addressed the positive effects on public opinion an organization received by its association with three recent movies—"Iron Man," "Transformers" and "Eagle Eve."

Qualls is an assistant professor who joined the department in 2008. He holds the juris doctorate and teaches mass communications law and television production.

Welsch, senior lecturer, joined the department in 1992 and is the head of the advertising major.

White, who has won both the Regent Teaching Award and the Max Carman Teaching Award, is a full professor who has taught in the department since 1991.

Valentine authors second book

Bob Valentine, senior lecturer in the Department of Journalism and Mass Communications, is often referred to as a "renaissance man" or a "man for all seasons," due to his many activities and accomplishments in the arts and communications fields.

He is a writer, columnist, editor, publisher, broadcaster, storyteller, actor, director, coach, playwright, producer, workshop conductor, stand-up comedian and teacher.

He recently wrote a book entitled *Seasons* that include pieces written for magazines, commentaries for WKMS-FM (NPR affiliate at Murray State), sermons given in regional churches and even stories told around campfires.

Arranged in order of the four seasons of the year, the paperback consists of 24 pieces. It was published by the New Caledonian Press in Murray in December, 2009.

The book is the second by Valentine. He and the late Hugh Eddie Wilson published *The Medical Money Mess* to explain the pitfalls of medical insurance. He and Wilson also established the Medical Claims Service to help people file their supplemental medical insurance claims

He serves as the senior editor for the Wake Up Book Series and as the owner/publisher of *Murray Life* Magazine. He writes for *Murray Life* as well as *Montage* and WKMS-FM.

He is known for his portrayal of the Unknown Scout, Thomas Edison, Mark Twain and most recently, Nathan B. Stubblefield in "Stubblefield Speaks." The Stubblefield documentary has appeared on KET and several public TV stations in the region.

He also performs at Scottish games throughout the U.S. and has a CD of Scottish stories, "I'll Take the Low Road."

A member of the MSU faculty since 1974, he teaches in advertising and is the instructor of the beginning course (JMC 168) for all majors in the department. He has taught in theatre and served as guest director for both the MSU Theatre and Murray's Community Theatre (Playhouse in the Park).

He began his teaching career at the University of Kentucky, where he earned his undergraduate degree in history and his master's degree in communications. He then served as lecturer in communications before coming to Murray State to teach speech courses and serve as the director of forensics.

His debate team won the national title in 1982 and captured many event trophies during his years as the debate coach.

He left teaching for several years to start several companies, including Theatre Arts Enterprises, Medical Claims Services and Prologue, LLC (the book publishing division).

Valentine returned to full-time teaching in 1999 with a split load between

JMC and Theatre. In 2001 he became cohead of Elizabeth Residential College with Bob McGaughey and served as the head from 2003-07.

As college head, he set up and taught many sessions in the residence hall and he and McGaughey taught the first for-credit course in the college.

He also established the student theatre group in Eliza-

beth that gives several presentations during the year.

He has taught for many years in the annual JMC High School Journalism and Broadcasting Workshop and he and McGaughey have done workshops in advertising, public relations and communications for more than 30 years.

The two have also entertained thousands in the mid-South as "Dr. Trey and Dr. Vee, the Communicators."

He was recognized for his outstanding teaching when he received the 2009 Regents Teaching Award for the College of

Business. He was recognized for his contributions to the arts when he won the Betty Lowry Award for leadership in the support of the arts in 1992 by the Murray-Calloway County Chamber of Commerce.

Valentine noted in a recent book signing that he and his editorial staff had a problem deciding which pieces to include in the book and which ones to leave out. This led to the question, will there be a part two of *Seasons?*

The answer will probably be yes but not right away for the "man of all seasons."

Cansler named director of Murray State's Hopkinsville campus

Valentine commemorates Mark Twain's demise

Bob Valentine, senior lecturer in the Department of Journalism and Mass Communications, was the presenter for the April 7 "brown bag" luncheon sponsored by the Research Policy Committee and the Office of the Provost.

Valentine's presentation title was "One Hundred Years of Silence—The Centennial of Mark Twain's Unexaggerated Demise."

He recalled several of the key dates and publications, noting that Twain (Samuel Langhorne Clemens) was foremost a journalist. He also explained why Twain was almost always seen in his white suit at dinners or at performances.

While the current rules of dress at the time called for a dark suit for evening functions after 6, Twain always wore white. Valentine explained it was so that he would stand out and the white suit, along with the long white hair, became his trademark.

Valentine said he has been Twain since 1973 when he involved in a stage presentation produced by his brother Richard. Since then he has developed the character and performed as the 74-year-old Twain more than 1,500 times.

According to Valentine, Twain (Nov. 30, 1835-April 21, 1910) was by all accounts a major figure in America. Ernest Hemmingway believed that all American literature dated from Twain's *Huckleberry Finn* and his comments on everything from society to government to nature rival Ben Franklin's *Poor Richard's Almanac* as popular aphorisms.

Valentine said that while Twain was noted for humor, Twain stated he did try to be funny. However, if humor allowed him to point out a problem that needed to be corrected he used it.

Valentine closed with an announcement that he would be doing his Twain show April 21, the anniversary of Twain's death.
