### II. COURSE DESCRIPTION AND PREREQUISITE(S):

First course in calculus develops main ideas of differentiation and integration of single-variable functions. Topics include limits, continuity, techniques of differentiation, graphing techniques, definite and indefinite integral, basic integration methods, and applications of the derivative and integral to natural and social sciences.

**Prerequisite(s):** ACT math standard score of at least 26 or MAT 150 or MAT 140/145.

**Calculator Limitations** Use of calculators such as the TI-89 and TI-92, which compute symbolic derivatives and integrals will not be allowed on the exams.

#### VIII. EVALUATION AND GRADING PROCEDURES:

A. Your course grade will be based on Exams, Homework, Online Assignments, Participation, and the Final Exam. Sixty percent of the course grade will come from 5 major exams (each exam counts 12 percent of the grade) and twenty percent of the course grade will come from the final exam. The homework (written) and online assignments will each contribute 7 percent while the participation grade is worth 6 percent of the course grade.. The grading scale is:

**Exams:** The Exams will test your comprehension of concepts and skills not covered on a previous exam. Exams may contain both problem-solving questions and essay questions. Exams occur for everyone (to be fair to everyone) on the scheduled date. Sometimes, however, extenuating circumstances do exist. If you absolutely must miss an exam, you are to stop by or call me (or leave a message with the office if I am not in when you call) before the exam to tell me why you cannot be at the exam. In addition, you must complete the "missed exam form" (see the course website) within one day. If you do not, you will get a zero on that exam with no opportunity to make it up. An excused missed exam will be made up in my office within two days (an extension may be granted in rare cases), with the grade to be determined as explained at that time. Our five semester exams will be **September 6, September 25, October 16, November 1,** and **November 22**.

**Final:** The Final will be a comprehensive exam covering any material addressed that semester. The Final exam will be on **Tuesday, December 10<sup>th</sup>** at **10:30 a.m.** in **FH 302**.

**Homework:** Homework will be assigned at the beginning of each section and will also be listed on the course web site. Homework will be collected once a week (Mondays!). (No Late Homework). Homework must be completed in pencil, separate from your notes, and on loose-leaf paper or paper without rough edges. **Staple** your papers together if you have used more than one sheet other wise your homework will not be graded. Your name and class meeting time should be written on the top right part of the first page.

**Online Assignments:** These are located on **webassign** and may be accessed via your Canvas Course Link. You will have two (2) attempts on each set of problems. The assignments will be available at the beginning of each section covered and will automatically switch off on the due dates. It is your responsibility to check online assignments at the start of any new sections.

**Participation:** Each day's discussion of new material depends on vigorous participation on your part. During the semester you will have to work out on the board a total of twenty (20) problems. Each problem will be worth 5 points. The problems have to picked from the assigned homework in the immediate past class meeting. Only one problem may be solved per class meeting and this will take place at the beginning of class.

The value of board presentations depend upon basic familiarity with the topic, and naturally, your participation might be limited by your attendance. See attendance policy below.

**Important Grade-dates:** The last day to drop a course without receiving a grade (or a W) is Monday, August 26. The last day to drop individual courses and receive a grade of "W" (no penalty) is Friday, November 22. The last day to change a full semester class from AUDIT to CREDIT is Monday, August 26. The last day to change a full semester class from CREDIT to AUDIT is Friday, November 22, if you qualify for an Audit. (See the Audit policy below.)

No classes during Labor Day September 2, Fall Break October 10 - 11, Thanksgiving Break November 27 - 29.

B. **Auditing**: If you seek to change your status to audit, you must continue to do all the graded assignments, to attend classes regularly after the audit is given, to miss no more than 5 class periods after the audit is given, and to maintain a grade of at least 70% of the grade they had upon taking the Audit. If these requirements are not followed, then an "E" will be earned for this course.

## IX. ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Students are expected to adhere to the MSU Attendance Policy outlined in the current MSU Bulletins.

Class attendance will be taken daily. If you miss class you are responsible for obtaining the day's notes and assignments. While you are not graded on class attendance, you are expected to attend every class period or your grade will suffer (indirectly) if you do not attend. If you miss three or fewer days (or do not miss at all) this semester, I will drop your four lowest online assignment scores and four written homework scores. To level the playing field between those who must miss classes because of MSU and those who do not, the only kind of absence which will not be counted in this regard is a university-required absence. Thus, anything else (for instance, being sick, going on a job interview, taking care of a sick relative, etc.) will count as one of these absences.

Note the following provisions on arriving late to class or leaving early:

Every two tardies (arriving late) will count as an absence.

Leaving class early will count as an absence unless you provide me with a reason in advance.

The faculty member should then take appropriate disciplinary action.

Disciplinary action may include, but is not limited to the following:

- 1) Requiring the student(s) to repeat the exercise or do additional related exercise(s).
- 2) Lowering the grade or failing the student(s) on the particular exercise(s) involved.
- 3) Lowering the grade or failing the student(s) in the course.

If the disciplinary action results in the awarding of a grade of E in the course, the student(s) may not drop the course.

Faculty reserve the right to invalidate any exercise or other evaluative measures if substantial evidence exists that the integrity of the exercise has been compromised. Faculty also reserve the right to document in the course syllabi further academic honesty policy elements related to the individual disciplines.

A student may appeal the decision of the faculty member with the department chair in writing within five working days. Note: If, at any point in this process, the student alleges that actions have taken place that may be in violation of the Murray State

University Non-Discrimination Statement, this process must be suspended and the matter be directed to the Office of Equal Opportunity. Any appeal will be forwarded to the appropriate university committee as determined by the Provost.
