Murray State University continued to lead the coordination effort for the statewide *Posters-at-the-Capitol* (P@C) program. All of Kentucky's public universities and the Kentucky Community and Technical College System participated in this program. Following this year's program, a student participation survey across all participants was conducted and returned a 20% response rate. Below is a snapshot of the program-wide survey results:

- Heavy senior participation in P@C
- Academic disciplines
  - Science 43%, Humanities and Fine Arts 16%, Business 16%, Agriculture 11%,
     Health Sciences and Human Services 8%, Education 3%, and other 3%
- 73% of respondents indicated their project was a result of an independent study
- 64% of respondents indicated they did not meet with their legislators while at P@C
- 60% of respondents indicated their faculty mentor attended P@C with them
- Key takeaways from the most valuable learning experience at P@C
  - Experience presenting projects to colleagues
  - o Learning to present in a non-scientific fashion
  - o Meeting faculty and student researchers from other institutions
- Positive Experiences
  - o Good on program communication 97.22% Satisfaction
  - o Good on program organization 86% Satisfaction
  - o Good on overall experience 89% Satisfaction

# **Professional Development**

- The Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarly Activity continued Murray State's
  institutional membership in the Council on Undergraduate Research (CUR). The Council on
  Postsecondary Education (CPE) continued to facilitate the membership process for all Kentucky
  public institutions to join as a "system" for better pricing. Institutional membership makes CUR
  resources available to all faculty, staff, and students.
- The Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarly Activity joined the University of Kentucky and the CPE in working to establish the Kentucky Consortium of Undergraduate Research (KCUR). More information about this statewide consortium of undergraduate research professionals is expected in 2014-2015.

# Other Activities

- Staffing structure for the office during 2013-2014 was the following: 1 quarter-time Faculty
  Coordinator, 1 half-time URSA Program Coordinator, and 1 Graduate Assistant. During this
  academic year, two in-person URSA Advisory Board meetings were held. Also, the URSA
  Advisory Board conducted several conversations and votes using the Board listsery.
- During the 2013-14 academic year, over 20 classroom visits took place to discuss the opportunities available through the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarly Activity.
- In February, the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarly Activity participated in the Admitted Student Open House to promote undergraduate research to potential students and their parents/guardians.
- The Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarly Activity in partnership with the MSU Foundation launched the inaugural cohort of the Research Policy Group. Their purpose was to engage in a policy-research project to produce a nonpartisan policy brief. The topic identified by State Representative Kenny Imes and State Senator Stan Humphries was "The Use of State Parks and Recreation Facilities as Economic Development Tools." On May, the Research Policy Group presented preliminary findings to Rep. Imes and Sen. Humphries. Their policy brief is still in development. Tentative plans for next year are to continue the Research Policy Group expanding on the same topic.
- In October, the Office again partnered with the School of Nursing and the Development Department to host a day-long session entitled "Evidence-based Best Practices in Clinical Healthcare." This gathering was to draw attention to and highlight undergraduate research activities of nursing students and raise awareness of future opportunities.
  - o 70 students participated in this program and a dozen faculty and staff members.
  - Poster and oral presentations were offered before and after lunch.
- In April, the Office, in conjunction with the Office of the Provost, awarded the University
  Distinguished Mentor Award to Dr. David Ferguson, Department of Agricultural Science, for his
  meritorious efforts.
